

Deborah Hurley is Principal of the science and technology policy consulting firm she founded in 1996. She is: Adjunct Faculty, Privacy Law and Ethical Issues in Cybersecurity, Cybersecurity Policy and Governance Program, Boston College; Adjunct Faculty, Boston College Law School; Fellow, Institute for Quantitative Social Science, and Global Innovation Policy Fellow, Technology and Entrepreneurship Center at Harvard (TECH), both at Harvard University; and Adjunct Professor of the Practice of Computer Science, Department of Computer Science, and Faculty, Data Science Initiative, both at Brown University. Hurley served as an Arbitrator, European Union – United States Privacy Shield Framework, and as Senior ICT Expert for the Pacific Region Infrastructure Facility, Sydney, Australia.

At the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in Paris, France, Hurley identified emerging technological, economic, social, and legal issues related to science, technology, and innovation policy, information and communications technologies, biotechnology, environmental and energy technologies, privacy and personal data protection, cybersecurity, nanotechnology, encryption, and other advanced technology fields. She was a Fulbright scholar in Korea. Hurley received the Namur Award of the International Federation for Information Processing in recognition of outstanding contributions, with international impact, to awareness of social implications of information technology.
